## **Building the Body of Christ**

Remember each month is dedicated to a particular Catholic devotion, based on the liturgical calendar or historical events. <u>February</u> is the month of the <u>Passion of Our Lord</u>.

During His prayer in Gethsemane, Christ offered Himself to the Eternal Father to satisfy His justice and to rescue humanity from eternal death. Jesus, the Son of God, gave consent that all the torments of <u>His Passion</u> and Death be let loose over that part of His human being that was capable of suffering. From that moment Christ suspended whatever consolation or relief would otherwise overflow from His impassible Divine nature to the passible part of His human nature so that His passion and sufferings might reach the highest degree possible. He did this for us. What can we do to comfort Him? I would suggest the following three devotions.

As a first devotion remember that at the beginning of <u>His Passion</u>, Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray. He asked three Apostles to "watch and pray" with Him for one hour. We who spend an hour in the adoration chapel or before the tabernacle in church are doing exactly what Jesus asked.

Inspiration for Local Councils by Sue Barker, MDCCW Leadership Commission Chair

February, celebrates a very important event in the Catholic Church; February II is the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes! Our Blessed Mother appeared to Bernadette Soubirous in Lourdes, France, 18 times in 1858. Bernadette was a poor peasant girl who was not believed when she told her family that a beautiful woman appeared to her, telling her to dig in the ground until water appeared. This was later turned into the "Grotto of Lourdes" after many people had been cured of physical ailments by bathing in or blessing themselves with that water.

This is just one case of our Blessed Mother appearing to people, many times children, and miracles happening. If you follow her direction, working with her son Jesus, prayers are answered. We do the same thing when we say our "Prayer to Our Lady of Good Counsel" at the beginning of every CCW meeting. Pray and look to Mary's leadership in all things!

## **SAINTS:** Saint Agatha

Saints tortured for their belief in God are Feasts, Memorials and many and we can hardly grasp the cruelty of their torture. Their witness to Christ in their martyrdom has built the foundation of our Communion of Saints.

> Saint Agatha of Sicily, born around 231 to a rich and noble family, chose for herself a life as a consecrated virgin. However, during Christian persecutions, a suitor had her arrested since she spurned his marriage proposals. Imprisoned in a brothel where she was violated, then tortured and maimed, a miraculous healing followed her vision of St. Peter. The cruelty continued: rolling her in hot coals mixed with sharp shards whose wounds she did not recover at age 20.

Saint Agatha is the Patron Saint of Sicily and Palermo, breast cancer patients, rape victims and wet nurses. She is considered a powerful intercessor for people who suffer from fires. Her Feast Day is February 5th.

- If you should die before completing the three years, for you it will be the same as if you had completed them.
- It will be upon your death the same as if you had shed all your blood for the holy faith.
- · I will descend from heaven to take your soul and that of your relatives, until the fourth -Benedetta DA S.S., Pope Leo XIII H, in Roma April 5, 1890.
