## THE PEN

'Unless the Lord builds the house, its builders labor in vain." Psalm 127:1 **Building the Body of Christ** 

During the Jubilee Year of Hope, the lay faithful are encouraged to participate in some pilgrimage. In his Pastoral Letter on Jubilee 2025, Bishop Donald J. Hying of Madison stated: "I pray that this Jubilee Year be a sacred time of spiritual renewal and active charity for every Catholic in the Diocese of Madison. By living the teachings of Christ, proclaiming the Gospel by word and deed, making disciples, and serving the mission of the Church, we will be witnesses to the hope that does not disappoint, and thus serve as instruments of the Lord's merciful salvation made manifest in Christ."

The Latin words 'per ager', means "across the fields," and 'per eger' means "border crossing.", so our word 'pilgrimage' comes from these root words and is understood as the undertaking of a journey. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says "Pilgrimages evoke our earthly journey toward Heaven" (CCC 2691).

A Pilgrimage is an opportunity of Grace, not a vacation. The pilgrim is drawn closer to God, to seek forgiveness, and to pray. A Pilgrim need not travel to Rome during Jubilee 2025, but can visit locally designated pilgrimage sites to gain the special indulgence(s) and to seek God's help in our call to missionary discipleship.

### St. Joseph Prayer

To you, O blessed Joseph, do we come in our tribulation, and having implored the help of your most holy Spouse, we confidently invoke your patronage also.

Through that charity which bound you to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God and through the paternal love with which you embraced the Child Jesus, we humbly beg you graciously to regard the inheritance which Jesus Christ has purchased by his Blood, and with your power and strength to aid us in our necessities.

O most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, defend the chosen children of Jesus Christ;

O most loving father, ward off from us every contagion of error and corrupting influence;

O our most mighty protector, be kind to us and from heaven assist us in our struggle with the power of darkness.

As once you rescued the Child Jesus from deadly peril, so now protect God's Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity; shield, too, each one of us by your constant protection, so that,

supported by your example and your aid, we may be able to live piously, to die in holiness, and to obtain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

Composed by Pope Leo XIII in his 1889 encyclical, Quamquam Pluries...He asked that it be added to the end of the Rosary, especially during the month of October, which is dedicated to the Rosary. The prayer is enriched with a partial indulgence (Handbook of Indulgences, conc. 19), and may be said after the customary Salve Regina and concluding prayer. It may also be used to conclude other Marian devotions.

- 4. Invite others to accompany you.
- 5. Reflect on areas of your life that need restoration or healing.
- 6. Go to the Sacrament of Confession before, during, or after your pilgrimage.
- 7. Dedicate plenty of time to enter into the spirit of prayer during your visit.
- 8. Intentionally fulfill the conditions to receive the Jubilee Indulgence.
- 9. Gather God's Blessings in key takeaways following your visit.

All are encouraged to make every effort to visit the Jubilee pilgrimage sites within the Diocese of Madison sometime during this year to seek the grace of transformation.

Jubilee Passports are available to record the visit and receive a special stamp at the pilgrimage site which entitles pilgrims who visit all the various sites to receive a frameable certificate upon completion.
